of Mathry in the County of Pembroke  
Farmer to the dwelling-houses or public  
Inns known as the Sailors Arms and  
Ship Inn. Fishguard. in the same County

---

I Hugh Davies of Tower Hill. Fishguard in  
the County of Pembroke Gentleman do hereby  
solemnly and sincerely declare as follows:—  
I know and have for upwards of Fifty years  
known the Inns called The Sailors Arms and The  
Ship Inn situate in Lower Town Fishguard aforesaid  
Both belonged for several years up to and previously  
to his death to the late Thomas Davies draper of  
Railway House. Fishguard (having been purchased  
by him in or about the year 1867) and afterwards  
to his son John Clement Davies. The Sailors Arms  
was at the time of its purchase called The Newport  
Arms and the Ship Inn for which the said  
Thomas Davies obtained the license was then a  
private house occupied by Thomas James.  
At the time of Thomas Davies' death in the  
year 1879 the Sailors Arms was occupied by  
James Jones and the Ship Inn by Mary Harries  
and at the time of John Clement Davies' death  
in the year 1889 the Sailors Arms was occupied  
by ~~Henry Lewis~~ or his undertenant, and the  
Ship Inn by ~~Enoch Evans~~ <sup>Robert Lewis</sup>. Both Inns now  
belong as I am informed and verily believe  
to M<sup>r</sup> James Davies of Penysfeidir under the  
Will of his late wife Catherine Maurice Davies  
deceased the same having been devised to her by



the said John Clement Davis.  
And I make this solemn declaration  
conscientiously believing the same to be true  
and by virtue of The Statutory Declarations Act 1835.
